

Dear Parents/ Guardians.

Because of the enforced closure of school, we have developed a bank of work for the children to complete. As you are aware, at this time, we cannot be certain when we will return to school and therefore I have asked the teachers to plan 12 weeks of work.

Every week each child is expected to complete three pieces of work in their English Skills, Reading Comprehension and Mental Arithmetic Book.

In Year Six, our topic this term has been all about Manchester. Can you child research a famous musician or band from our local area? Can your children be writing their own song? Could they create a poster to advertise their favourite band or musician from Manchester? Your child could make album cover for their chosen band.



Your child could also create a poem or a piece of artwork of their choice about Manchester.





In Science we have been learning all about animals and humans. Can your child research an animal in our local area and how it has adapted to survive? They could create their own animal with features that have adapted to survive or design a habitat for that animal to live in — can they explain why they designed their habitat for their chosen animal?

Within this pack, an activity grid has been provided with further suggestions activities that your child can complete.

### Reading

Please encourage your child to **read every day**. Below is a list of activities they can do to develop their skills;

#### Writing

Please encourage your child to write every day, below is a list of activities they can do to develop their skills;


- 1. Practice letter formation. Making sure that letters are of the correct size relative to each other using the handwriting guide attached.
- 2. Writing short stories about the day they have had, about their favourite toy or teddy, adventures with an imaginary friend or anything at all they want to write about. - 3. Playing spelling games using the attached common exception words from Year 6 and using these words in sentences remembering correct punctuation.
